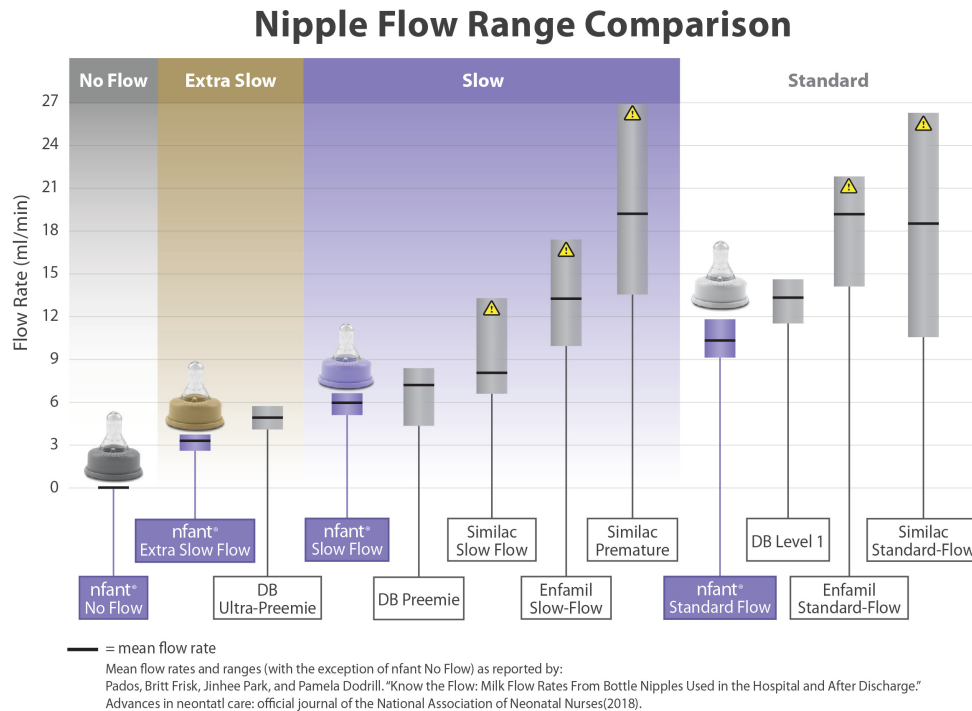


New Study Shows nfant Nipples are Best in Class

Slow and steady wins the race... A peer reviewed study examining nipple flow rates of both hospital and consumer-based nipples has just been published by independent researchers in *Advances in Neonatal Care* (the official journal of the National Association of Neonatal Nurses). The mean flow rate and variability of nipples from 4 hospital brands were tested and categorized, including NFANT Labs. So...how did NFANT fare among hospital nipples in each category? Check out the updated numbers:



Key Take Aways

Extra Slow Category: nfant Extra Slow nipple is significantly slower than the Dr. Brown's UltraPreemie nipple.¹

Slow Category: The nfant Slow Flow nipple is ranked as the slowest flow in its category followed by Dr. Brown's Preemie and the Similac Single Use Slow.¹

Standard Category: The nfant Standard Flow nipple was significantly slower than any of the competitors in the Standard category.¹

Time to Reconsider:

⚠️ "[Enfamil Standard, Similac Standard, Similac Premature, Enfamil Slow and Similac Slow] products may be appropriate for healthy, full-term infants, for whom the effect of flow and/or variability is negligible, but the data indicate that it may be time to reconsider the nipples that are used for feeding vulnerable infants. Providing consistent and safe flow rates that support positive feeding experiences in infants with medical complexity should be a priority." - (Pados et al, 2018)
